FLORIDA HISTORY

MARY MCLEOD BETHUNE

When Mary McLeod Bethune, the daughter of former slaves, was a child, she desperately wanted to learn to read. But her family was poor, and none of her brothers or sisters were able to attend school. She begged her mother to let her go to school, and her mother agreed that Mary could go to the mission school in Sumter County, South Carolina. Every morning she had to walk five miles to school, and every afternoon she walked five miles to get home. That's a total of ten miles, which is about the distance from the traffic light in Archer to Butler Plaza in Gainesville! Imagine a child being willing to walk that distance every day to get an education!

She was such a good student that, after graduating from mission school in 1887 (when she was twelve years old), she was offered a scholarship to attend Scotia Seminary in North Carolina. She did not see her family again for five years. In addition to attending school full time, she had to work to pay for her room and food. When she graduated from Scotia in 1894, she won another scholarship to the Moody Bible Institute in Chicago, Illinois. She was the only African American at that school.

Mary was a devout Christian who spent her spare time helping the poor and homeless people in Chicago. She wanted to be a missionary in Africa, but there were no missionary jobs available for her, so she decided to help African Americans in

the United States. She returned to her home town in South Carolina and taught school, sharing her salary with her family. She helped send her two younger sisters to school and helped her parents pay their bills.

In 1898, she married Albertus Bethune, who was also a teacher. They had a son, Albertus, Jr., in 1899. When he was six months old, she accepted a teaching job in Palatka, where she also did missionary work among the poor and worked part-time selling insurance.

Ms. Bethune wanted to open her own school for African American children. She rented a cottage in Daytona Beach and opened the Daytona Normal and Industrial Institute for Negro Girls. She had five students who each paid 50 cents a week for their education. In 1923, her school combined with Cookman Institute, forming the school known today as Bethune-Cookman Institute.

Frank Lopez gave me a copy of a letter Mary McLeod Bethune mailed out in 1940, asking people to attend a fund raiser for her school. The guest speaker was none other than the first lady, Eleanor Roosevelt!

Mary McLeod Bethune spent her life fighting prejudice and promoting education. Presidents Calvin Coolidge and Herbert Hoover appointed her to several important positions. She died in 1955. Thirty years after her death, a postage stamp was issued in her honor. *M. Zander*
